We will be able to move some larger items out of building #3 that do not require a temperature controlled environment and at the same time give us a space to collect garage sale items year round. We are looking at many new changes that will help to not only protect the artifacts but, display them for better viewing. One of these would be to build some kiosks over the items located outside the museum. We would like to find a Caboose or dinning car to have on display. Some lofty ideas, but ones that I believe are possible to attain. Let us put our heads together and find a way to make the dream happen.

The History of the Apron

I don't think our kids today know what an apron is.

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect her dress underneath, because she had only a few, and it was easier to wash aprons than dresses. They used less material, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven. It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears. From the chicken coop to the house, Grandma used her apron for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven. When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.

When the weather was cold, grandma wrapped it around her arms. Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls. In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees. When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds. When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men knew it was time to come in from the fields for dinner. It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that old time apron that served so many purposes.

Helpful Hint #1

Helpful Hint #3

Some holiday cookies require an indent on top to fill with jam or chocolate. Use the rounded end of a honey dipper to make the indent.

STRAWBERRY COOKIES

can Eagle Brand Milk
 can angle flake coconut (1 lb)
 pkg. strawberry jello
 Pinch of cream of tartar
 Pinch of salt

Take 1 ½ pkg. of jello and mix with milk and coconut. Add salt and cream of tartar. Let set in refrigerator at least an hour or overnight. Shape into berries and roll in balance of jello. Dye toothpicks green (break in half). Put three leaves of green frosting on each berry. Makes about 65, depending on size.

I roll them in red sugar instead of the jello. It makes them brighter. Leaves can be bought from Maid of Scandia instead of using frosting as the leaves.

GRANT WRITER NEEDED

HOLLY WREATHS

1 Cup Butter 1 Cup Sugar 1 Egg 2 tsp. Evaporated Milk 2 tsp. Vanilla 1 Scant tsp Soda 1 Scant tsp Baking Powder ¹⁄4 tsp Salt 2 ¹⁄2 Cups Flour

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add egg, milk and vanilla. Stir until well mixed. Sift flour, then measure. Resift with soda, baking powder and salt. Stir into first mixture. Chill dough and press through pastry tube in shape of a holly wreath onto greased baking sheet. Decorate tops of wreaths with bits of angelica and candied cherries. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 10 minutes. Makes 4 dozen cookies

FINGER COOKIES

Cream 7/8 cup shortening and 5 tablespoons white sugar. Add 1 tablespoon water, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 cups unsifted cake flour and 1 cup chopped nuts (coarse). Roll like fingers. Bake 20 minutes. When cool, roll in powered sugar.

FAIRY KISSES

Beat whites of 4 eggs stiff. Add 1 cup white sugar 3 cups Corn Flakes 1 cup cocoanut 1/3 tsp Salt 1 cup chopped nuts 1 tsp Vanilla Drop by teaspoon on buttered pan. Bake in slow oven until brown.

SANDBAKKEL-SE

2 cups Sugar4 eggs2 cups lard or shortening1 tsp vanilla1 cup butterenough flour to make stiffdough. Press dough into forms of different shapes and bakein hot oven

Butter Saver

When butter is too hard to spread easily, use a vegetable peeler to shave off thin curls from the stick. Almost instantly they will be soft and easy to spread.

Pie Baking Tip

When baking a fruit pie, cut soda straws in four pieces and insert into pie. Steam will escape through straws and pie will not run over in oven.

Neat Trick

To remove nut meats whole, soak nuts overnight in salt water before cracking.

No Stick

Rub butter on scissors before cutting marshmallows or fruit. It prevents sticking

Save an Egg

To boil an egg that is cracked, just wrap it in aluminum foil and boil like any other egg.

AITKIN OPERA HOUSE BUILDING

Built in 1903, the Aitkin Opera House was the early cultural center of the community.

Cultural Center of the Community

Aitkin sprang from the wilderness in 1871, materializing where the Mississippi and the railroad met. The settlement was a wild frontier lumber town and riverboat transportation center that swarmed with lumberjacks each summer as the 'boys' came to town to spend their paychecks in the 16 saloons and various "bawdy houses' in the community.

Knifings, shootings and street brawls, involving men fresh from the lumber camps, weren't uncommon in the early days. In sharp contrast, church socials, costume balls, literary clubs and theatre groups were equally commonplace.

In 1902, Samuel Hodgeden sought to enhance the cultural offerings of the community by constructing a new building that would contain a beautiful opera house. He traveled to Chicago and New York to visit the best opera houses in those cities to formulate plans for his own design.

The original building was a two-story structure with a footprint of 50' x 75'. One year late, Hodgeden expanded the original structure to double its size, making the total length 150'. Unlike the first section built a year earlier, this added section was constructed with bricks made in Aitkin from Mississippi mud and fired locally.

Many historians credit the birth of the shopping mall to the 1960's. The community of Aitkin challenges this theory. In the 1900's, Aitkin's opera house building housed a general merchandise store, bank, barber shop, hardware store, seed & deed warehouse, buggy & wagon shop, bath house and the opera house – all under one roof!

Any person could arrive in town by train or steamboat and could quite literally walk in the front door of the Hodgeden-MacDonald building an buy feed and hardware needed to start up their homestead, get needed food and clothing, a wagon and team to haul everything, a shave, a bath, take in a vaudeville performance at the opera house and get a bank loan to pay for everything --- all without ever having to leave the building! STEP BACK IN TIME

AITKIN INDEPENDENT AGE – NOVEMBER 30, 1909

FERRYBOAT SUNK AT PINE KNOLL

TEAM BARELY ESCAPED AND LIVES WERE ENDANGERED

The Pine Knoll ferry has gone down. The big barge developed a leak of unusual proportion Saturday and shortly after having taken a team across safely, filled with water and went to the bottom. The mishap might have been fatal - in fact, came very near being so - and should be regarded with a good deal of seriousness.

Travel with light loads may cross the Aitkin Bridge and go by way of the meadows while things are frozen up, but early in the spring something will have to be done. This again brings up the demand for a road across the meadows that will be passable at all times of the year and also revives the demand for a Pine Knoll bridge.

It has been discovered since the sinking of the boat that the line holding it has been cut and the swift current is drifting it down stream. Ferryboats being out of date and a menace to life and property perhaps its loss may be a good thing for those who have to cross the Mississippi, and possibly for the taxpayers.

Do's and Don'ts For Junior High

For the benefit of the many new students and old students as well who evidently do not know what the "do's" and "don'ts" about order in the junior assembly are, Mr. Aanestad has gladly given our staff the following information.

Study period is conducted from 8:25 until 8:55. Anyone entering the assembly during that time is expected to take his seat and study or at least keep quiet so his "industrious" neighbors can study. At 8:55 roll is taken, and, quoting one of our principals, "that is one time during the day when I do want it quiet."

During vacant periods the students are expected to remain in the assembly, and pass slips must be secured if any wish to leave to go to the library or see a teacher. All students who are absent must bring with them an excuse from their parents and must then obtain from Mr. Aanestad an admittance slip which they must present to each teacher for their assignments. If all work is not make up within a certain specified time the students receive a failing grade on the work missed.

Incidentally, the reward for obeying "do's" and "don'ts" is a royal blue mark in deportment and a possibility of receiving all blue marks on report cards. Anyone desiring to find out the penalty for disobedience may just not do the "do's" and do the "don'ts" and he will certainly and speedily find out.
