May began with the sixth grade class from Aitkin visiting the museum. One hundred and one students and teachers toured our facility. Jerry Hedberg and Larry Nelson talked about the Railroads. Janet Miller showed the children our research facility. Alice Fageroos talked about the Steamboats and the main room. Jo White worked in the Homestead room. Boyd Bremner played Joe Gurty camp cook and talked about life in the Logging camps. Alice Dotzler was our timer. Serving as guides were: Everett Davies, Shirley Davies, Ron White, Connie Pettersen, Cheryl Meld, Mary Rea, Donna Midkiff, Sue Benson, Ruth Carlstrom and Carol Bailey. Bill Stimac acted as our photographer. A lunch was served to our volunteers of Brats grilled by Everett, potato salad and tuna salad made by Donna Midkiff, home made baked beans made by Alice Fageroos, Peanut butter cookies made by Shirley Davies and an applesauce cake made by Greg Leach. We also had potato chips and pickles. It was a very nice day. The letters of thanks that we receive from the children make all the work worth it.

Also, on the first of May we sent out membership notices. Our year runs from June 1<sup>st</sup> to May 31<sup>st</sup>. If you have not been able to send in your membership please do so now. Your membership is very important to us because it helps us to continue our work of collecting, preserving and disseminating information about Aitkin County.

My brother Bruce Leach donated 24 decks of **SHIPERIO** cards. **The Game of Golf.** Shiperio is a fun and exciting card game that's played like a round of golf. Just like on the course players will succeed with skill, strategy and of course... a little luck. Shiperio is a game everyone will enjoy. Bruce invented the game with a friend and now Shiperio is for sale throughout the twin cities. Regularly priced at \$8.00, we have them for sale at the Depot for only \$5.95. New displays were completed during the month of May. Our dentist display has come down and replaced with a hair dressers display. The scariest item in this display has to be the Permanent Wave Machine. It looks like a jelly fish. In building #2 the ladies fashion display was removed and replaced with a display featuring children's clothes and baptismal items.

Alice Fageroos donated a variety of Hostas for our Perennial gardens between our display buildings. Nancy and Jon Jacobson along with Ron Ritter have handled the planting. We are still looking for more plants to add to our gardens this fall. The Museum could use flowering plants that bloom during different times of the summer. June 7<sup>th</sup> brought the Aitkin County Commissioners for their annual visit to the museum. Also, our County Auditor Kirk Peysar attended the luncheon. We showed them what was new at the museum and served them lunch. Cheryl Meld made potato salad and bars, Alice Fageroos made a pot of beans, Lorraine Liljenquest made lemon bars and brownies, and Sue Benson brought pickles. Fried Chicken was served as the main course. I brought an Applesauce cake.

On Saturday June 11th, raffle tickets were sent out to our membership with a list of the 29 prizes donated by ACHS members, local businesses and other Minnesota businesses. (Remember to listen to KKIN radio at 9:00 am on Tuesday August 9<sup>th</sup> for our early-bird raffle drawing.) Our list of prizes has grown to 36.

The second railroad speeder went on display June 24<sup>th</sup>. Volunteers had to clean up and paint the base and then fabricate a cab. After looking at several different cabs they came up with one. It looks pretty close to the pictures of others we looked at. Good job! Our next project will be fabricating a lumber wagon.

At 7:30pm on June 24<sup>th</sup> we were blessed with the arrival of the **1905 Mechanical Horse "Champion".** Champion rode off into the sunset on January 28<sup>th</sup> of 2006 to play with children in Sparta, Wisconsin. After being absent from Aitkin for almost five and a half years Champion galloped back into town to make his permanent home at the Depot Museum. Champion was donated to the museum by Dr. Jill Stebbins and Dr Mark Hemmerich, as well as their four children, Caitlin, Sarah, Celia and Natalie in remembrance of and in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Frank and Betty Stebbins and Mr. and Mrs. Howard and Olga Smith, Sr. who were long-time owners and operators of the Ben Franklin, an Aitkin landmark for decades. The rest of the Stebbins family was happy about the donation of Champion to the Museum. Champion will be able to live out the rest of his

days bringing back fond memories for the residents of Aitkin and new memories for our children and grandchildren. Come to the Depot Museum and get reacquainted with Champion.

Aitkin HS All-class reunion hit town from June 25<sup>th</sup> to July 3<sup>rd</sup>. We were open everyday during the all-class reunion from 9am to 4pm. Aitkin school displays filled the Depot building. **Bob Lake donated 32 Aitkin year books** for the display and our archives. The reprint of our book "Aitkin County Heritage" was available for sale at this event for \$39.95. During this nine day event we had 412 visitors to the museum. Over \$1000.00 worth of merchandise in books and souvenirs sold in our gift shop. Also a reprint of the Aitkin Centennial book which we sold for \$9.95. We sold 7 new memberships and 43 raffle tickets at this event. Terry Mejdrich held a book signing on June 30<sup>th</sup> at the Museum from 1pm – 3pm. We helped visitors find obituaries and copies of birth records from the Beecroft hospital. Visitors came from 26 different states, Germany, Australia, England and Canada. Thanks to everyone that helped to staff the museum during this event. Visitors were thrilled when they saw that Champion had returned to Aitkin to stay. Many of the visitors were from Aitkin and had never been in the Museum and for others it had been years. "We will be back" was heard from many of our visitors.

The Aitkin County Fair ran from July 13<sup>th</sup> thru July 16<sup>th</sup>. This year our display in the Log cabin was about logging in Aitkin County. Our Camp kitchen display, logging model display, and logging equipment were put on display. Various artifacts and photographs from our displays and storage were featured this year at the fair. We had a total of 1171 people visit the log cabin during the fair.

Last year we set a new record of 126 donations beating the old record of 85 set in 2009. These donations consist of artifacts, photos and paper items relating to Aitkin County history. Each donation ranges from one item to fifty items or more. This year we have received a total of 102 donations as of July 29<sup>th</sup>. During the record breaking year of 2010 we did not receive that many donations until September 29<sup>th</sup>. We are on pace to shatter last years record. We are only as good as the items we receive. Help us to complete our Aitkin County history by donating artifacts and information to the Depot Museum. Keep donating those artifacts, photos and information pertaining to events, people and history of Aitkin County.

We now have a new feature on our web site. Every week we will feature a photo of the week. Do you have an old family photo that you would be willing to share on our web site? Maybe it is an old picture of a church, school, business or event in Aitkin County. Help us make our web site a place that people want to visit over and over again. If you have an idea for our web site, share it with us. We want to make the site a fun and interesting place so that people continue to visit.

Riverboat history needed!! We are still looking for information about the Riverboats that operated between Aitkin and Grand Rapids. Looking for histories of the Riverboats, who built them, how big where they, years of operation, crews names, log books, etc. If you have old photos of the riverboats or information please contact Greg at the Depot Museum. (927-3348). Please let the Historical Society make copies for our files. Very little is known about many of the boats that operated out of Aitkin. The Riverboats played an incredible part in the building and growth of Aitkin County. If you know someone that has information or photos of the Riverboats, please let them know that we need their help with completing this portion of Aitkin County history.

**Caboose, Caboose,** has anyone seen a **Caboose.** We are still in search of a Caboose to have on display at the museum. When you are traveling around Aitkin County or the surrounding Counties please keep an eye out for a Caboose. We are looking for one that still has its wheels and has a cupola on it. One that needs some tender loving care would be fine. The men are looking for a project to work on.

**Membership** is growing steadily. At the end of January we were at 280 members and currently we are at 343. My goal is to have over 400 members by the end of 2012. Membership is one of the keys to keeping the Aitkin County Historical Society healthy. By our membership growing it brings awareness in the community of the work we are doing to preserve our Aitkin history. Aitkin residents are starting to think of us to donate items, rather than throwing them away. Important pieces of our history are now being donated to the society.

The work on our Obituary files continues. We have now completed our files through 1945. Our files have grown from two drawers to six. During the all-class we were able to go to our files and find obits for people that were not in our files a year ago. This project is already starting to save us time on research projects. Thank you to everyone who has worked on this project. We are half way done. If you would like to help with this project contact Greg at the Depot.

#### **County Fair**

Total sales at the County Fair were \$416.41. (96 Raffle tickets, 5 Aitkin County Heritage books, 3 Aitkin Centennial books, 16 movies, 1 train whistle, 4 train banks, 3 Seasons In Time, 3 Aitkin County Naturally and 1 Dream Catcher Necklace). Fair attendance was down due to poor weather most of the fair. Our attendance in the Log Cabin was down 270 from last year. Next year we will be doing a display on Restaurants, such as the Beacon Arch. We had visitors from all over the state of Minnesota plus 15 other states, (Illinois, Tennessee, South Dakota, North Dakota, Florida, Pennsylvania, Arizona, North Carolina, Louisiana, Washington, Connecticut, Alaska, Wisconsin, Texas, and New York) and two Foreign Countries (Germany and Japan).

#### ALL-CLASS VISITORS

We had a total of 432 people visit the museum during the All-class reunion. Visitors came from all over Minnesota plus from 28 other states. (California, Virginia, Tennessee, Arizona, Missouri, Florida, Maine, Oregon, Texas, Arkansas, Washington, Wisconsin, Ohio, Alaska, Michigan, North Dakota, Iowa, Hawaii, Massachusetts, South Dakota, Montana, Georgia, Indiana, Arkansas, Illinois, Colorado, Michigan and Kansas) Five other countries were represented. (Germany, Australia, Canada, Mexico and England)

## THE YEAR WAS 1948

- January 5<sup>th</sup> Bing Crosby is named as the top moneymaking star for the 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive year.
- January 18<sup>th</sup> In India Mohandas Gandhi ends his fast after 121 hours following the presentation of a peace pledge signed by over 200,000. The Sikh, Moslem and Hindu communities endorse the pledge.
- January 30<sup>th</sup> Hindu spiritual leader Mohandas Gandhi, 78, is shot to death by Hindu Extremist in New
- February 5<sup>th</sup> Harvard freshman Dick Button, 18, wins the Gold Medal in Men's Figure Skating, completing the first successful double axle during competition.
- February 12<sup>th</sup> Indian Leader Mohandas Gandhi, who was assassinated on January 39<sup>th</sup> by a Hindu extremist, has his ashes scattered into the waters of the Ganges River during a national ceremony attended by Indian Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru.
- March 4th A quart of fresh milk delivered to homes across the U.S. is selling for an average price of 21 cents. Longshoremen now average \$4,084 a year, according to CIO officials who are seeking wage
- May 1<sup>st</sup> The bay colt "Citation", with jockey Eddie Arcaro aboard, wins the 74<sup>th</sup> **Kentucky Derby**, running the 1 ¼ mile in a time of 2:05 2/5. Arcaro becomes the first jockey to have won the Derby 4 times. (1938, 1941, 1945) Citation earns \$83,400 for owner Warren M. Wright's Calumet Farm. A \$2.00 "to win" wager pays \$2.80.

- May 4<sup>th</sup> American food shoppers can pick up a pound of **dairy-fresh butter** at their local supermarkets for the average cost of 87 cents while just 3 years ago, the average price of butter was 51 cents per pound.
- May 15<sup>th</sup> Wonder horse "Citation", with jockey Eddie Arcaro aboard, wins the **Preakness Stakes** for 3-year-olds, running the 1 3/16 mile distance in a time of 2:02 2/5.
- June 1<sup>st</sup> The average **annual wage** per working person in the U.S. for this year is \$2,933.
- June 9<sup>th</sup> The average cost of purchasing precious metals during this year is \$35 for an ounce of gold and 74 cents for an ounce of silver. Ford recently announces it will be increasing prices on its 1949 cars by up to \$125. Currently, its cars range in price from \$1,154 up to \$1,972.
- June 12<sup>th</sup> Eddie Arcaro aboard "Citation" wins the Belmont to complete horse racing's "**Triple Crown**" Arcaro also won the Triple Crown in 1941 aboard the sensational horse "Whirlaway". Ben Hogan wins the U.S. Open Golf Championship. First prize of \$2,000.
- June 19<sup>th</sup> The 80<sup>th</sup> Congress of the U.S. adjourns after two years, one of the longest sessions in history, having considered over 11,000 bills. One of the last bills passed is a draft calling for 19-25 year olds to provide 21 months of military service.
- July 8<sup>th</sup> The hourly Minimum wage in the U.S. this year is 40 cents, which has been in effect since 1945.
- July 18<sup>th</sup> The U.S. Postal Service is charging customers 3 cents to mail a first-class letter anywhere within the country. The Post Office first began service in 1775, collecting a minimum of 6 cents to deliver a letter less than 30 miles up to a ;maximum of 25 cents for over 450 miles.
- July 22<sup>nd</sup> A recent "NY Herald Tribune" poll of eligible voter indicates that 50.5% of those surveyed would vote for Tomas Dewey while only 28.2% favored President Truman.
- August 16<sup>th</sup> One of baseball's all-time heroes, Babe Ruth, 53 dies in New York City. The legendary Ruth played in 2,503 games and hit an amazing 714 home runs, with a career slugging average of .690. Ruth also led the league in home runs for 11 straight years. In 1927, Ruth hit 60 home runs, a record that will stand until 1961 when Roger Maris will eclipse the mark.
- September 23<sup>rd</sup> Republican Presidential candidate Thomas Dewey continues his coast-to-coast campaigning, constantly being assured by his advisors that all polls reflect he will easily win the November election. In many circles Dewey is listed as a 10-1 choice to win.
- October 11<sup>th</sup> The visiting Cleveland Indians edge the Boston Braves 4-3 to clinch the World Series of Baseball. Led by manage Lou Boudreau, the Indians win their first World Series since they defeated Brooklyn in 1920.
- October 18<sup>th</sup> The "New York Times" reports that N.Y. Governor Republican Tomas Dewey is assured of at least 333 electoral votes, compared to President Truman's 82. The national election, only two weeks away, appears to heavily favor Dewey.
- November 2<sup>nd</sup> President Harry S. Truman defeats Republican challenger Thomas E. Dewey by 2.2 million popular votes and 114 electoral votes. Many people believe Truman's victory is due to the extensive 10,000 miles he logged while campaigning on his Whistle-Stop Tour. In a move to jump the gun, the "Chicago Tribune" publishes a poorly-judged prediction headline that will haunt the newspaper forever.
- November 18<sup>th</sup> Many continue to speculate what Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip will name their newborn son.
- November 23<sup>rd</sup> A Box-Office Poll lists the nation's favorite movie stars for 1948: Bing Crosby, Ingrid Bergman and Gary Cooper.
- December 3<sup>rd</sup> Coffee drinkers across the country are paying an average price of 51 cents per pound for their favorite beverage
- December 25<sup>th</sup> From the Hit Parade: The #1 song this week is "All I Want for Christmas (Is My Two Front Teeth)" by Spike Jones. It will remain the top spot for three weeks. The #1 song on the Country & Western Chart is "A Heart Full OF Love (For a Handful of Kisses)" by Eddy Arnold.
- December 29<sup>th</sup> "Time Magazine" has selected President Harry Truman as **Man of the Year.** Truman was also "Times" choice for Man of the Year in 1945.
- December 31<sup>st</sup> The estimated population of the United States this year is 147,500,000.
