We have an opportunity to buy the National Guard Armory building and adjacent Morton building for \$355,000.00. The value on the tax statement is 600 thousand. Should we pursue this opportunity to expand our museum or let it go? I am currently searching for grants to buy the building. No luck so far. The building would give us the ability to showcase more of our artifacts and the history of Aitkin County. The garage area of the building is set up as a wood shop with vacuums for the machines. We could operate a wood shop for seniors to use. Our building on 1st Street N.W. could be sold and everything moved to one location.

Another thing to consider is that we will probably receive title to the land under the depot and other display building this year. We could add on to our second building. The biggest thing is finding additional ways of making money to cover the expenses of the Armory. Give me your thoughts. This is a decision that I believe everyone should voice their opinion on.

Not only would the Armory give us an opportunity to display more artifacts, it would give us a chance to create a research facility which would include our library and a genealogy department. Our office could be located in one location instead of spread out throughout the museum. The possibilities for displays are endless, but do we need it?

During the end of March and the first week in April we had four groups of 4 and 5 year old pre-schoolers from Aitkin come and visit the museum. The parents picked up their children here at the museum. For most, it was their first visit to the museum. A total of 156 students, teachers and parents visited the museum. The children were well behaved and I hope that this will become an annual event.

Our busy season started with the 6th grade tours of the Museum on May 2nd. Two groups of students and teachers from Aitkin came to the museum and learned about life in early Aitkin County. The areas that our presenters shared with the students were: life in a logging camp, railroads, riverboats, genealogy, and the homestead room. The students always get excited when we show them pictures of their relatives, cringe when Boyd talks about the bathing habits of the loggers, and jump when we ring the riverboat bell. We had a lunch for all of the volunteers that help with this event.

Work has already begun on our Annual Garage sale that takes place at the Aitkin County Fair grounds the first weekend in August. Two buildings have been reserved for us to use again this year. Some merchandise has be picked up and/or delivered to the museum and marked for the sale. Before you throw out that old furniture, kitchen cabinets, holiday decorations, tools, sporting goods, books, records, dishes, electronics etc. contact the Depot. **All donations are tax deductible**. This year's display in our Log Cabin at the County fair will be on Aitkin County restaurants. Do you have a unique item from a restaurant from Aitkin County? Please consider letting us borrow it for the display.

Watch for our raffle tickets that will be going out in the mail the first week in June. Check out the list of prizes that we have received so far in this newsletter. Our raffle drawing is our second largest fund raiser of the year. My goal is to at least hit budget this year. We need to sell 2000 tickets. Last year we sold 1917. Help us reach our goal this year.

This spring we need to put new chinking in our log cabin at the fair grounds. Would you like to help with this project? Currently you can look out between the logs. Wind, rain and critters can get into our cabin. This is the second oldest building in the state of Minnesota built especially for a historical society. Let us get a group together and get the cabin fixed before we lose it.

Don't forget about our gift shop when buying gifts for your friends and relatives. We have many coffee table and local history books available. We carry over 200 book titles in our store. Remember, that members receive a 10% discount in our gift shop. Profits from the store go to help fund events at the Depot.

PEACH CARAMEL SHORTCAKE

2 – Cups sifted flour ½ cup milk 1 - tsp. salt½ cup shortening

whipping cream 1 – egg, slightly beaten fresh slice peaches 2 – tbsp. sugar

3 tsp. baking powder Caramel Topping (recipe below)

Heat oven to 450 degrees (hot). Grease a sq. pan, 9X9X1 ¾ '. Sift together dry ingredients; cut in shortening. Stir in milk and egg. Pat dough evenly in pan. Crumble caramel Topping over top. Bake 10 to 15 minutes. Cut in squares and serve with fresh peaches and whipped cream.

Caramel Topping: Cream 2 tbsp. butter and ½ cup brown sugar; stir in ¼ cup chopped nuts.
